“How Estonia became the most Innovative Economy in Emerging Europe”

*The Republic of Estonia, in northern Europe, was once within Soviet Union but gained independence on 20th August 1991. Despite having a population of only 1.3 million, it is the **most innovative economy** in Emerging Europe, and the 24th most innovative globally, according to the 2019 Global Innovation Index. They were the ones who started Skype, and many other innovative solutions.*

We can learn a few things from them.

1) Innovation is independent of size of the city

The country has shown the world that innovation has little or nothing to do with size of the city or country.

2) Launch of the e-Residency Platform

To overcome its smallness, they launched this platform for anyone to become an e-citizen from Dec 2014, with only Euro100. More than 20,000 have applied.

3) A Digital Nation

The Estonian Government has created the digital platform to support businesses, where applicants (like an e-Resident of Estonia) can open and run a global European Union (EU) based company completely online, regardless of the location of the applicant in the world.

4) Tips for other Governments
